1. What is the National Black Disability Coalition (NBDC)?

The **National Black Disability Coalition (NBDC)** is a groundbreaking, Black-disabled led initiative launched by the ASE Community Foundation for Black Canadians with Disabilities. It is the first national coalition in Canada dedicated to centering the leadership, experiences, and priorities of Black people with disabilities. The Coalition is open to Black-disabled people, parents, caregivers, guardians, and allied organizations committed to disability justice and systemic change. We commit to at least 70% of our leaders and members self-identifying as Black and disabled. Please visit our <u>website</u> for more information

- 2. How do I become a member or join a committee/affinity group? Complete the online application form. All applicants must meet the criteria and commitment to supporting Black Disability Justice. Your application will be reviewed, and you will receive an email.
- 3. What's the difference between the Steering Committee, Executive Committee, Affinity Groups, and General Membership?
 - Steering Committee (Nov 2024 Apr 2025): Designed the Coalition's structure, framework, and core goals.
 - Executive Committee (May 2025 Nov 2025): Provides strategic and operational leadership, coordinates Coalition initiatives, and oversees events.
 - Affinity Groups (May 2025 Nov 2025): Thematic working groups (e.g., Youth, Entrepreneurship, Research & Policy and



Health), each led by Black-disabled leaders who set group-specific goals and report to the Executive Committee.

- **General Membership** (Jun 2025 Nov 2025): Open to all Black-disabled individuals, the community, and allies. No honoraria
