About the Study

This community-based research project amplifies the voices of Black parents and caregivers of children with disabilities in Toronto's early childhood education (ECE) settings. In partnership with the Every Child Belongs (ECB) unit, it aims to uncover systemic barriers, highlight lived experiences, and develop solutions for more inclusive ECE environments through a theory of change and staff training.

Using interviews, focus groups, and community consultations, the project—led by Black researchers and parents with lived experience and grounded in the Black Feminist Disability Framework—aims to inform public policy and improve early childhood education practices to better support Black children with disabilities and their families.

Understanding Extra Needs in Child Care


Black Children with Extra Needs in Childcare Settings:

- Inclusive environments that recognize the impact of ableism and anti-Black racism on Black children's experiences in early learning spaces.
- Support processes that affirm Black identity and culture while meeting diverse disability needs.
